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Late October and early November, of course, was a sad time because of Carl's death so we have made a special point of spending time with family for the holidays. In late November we drove out to North Carolina for a pre-Thanksgiving gathering of the Sienkewicz clan to celebrate the retirements of Tom's siblings Toni and Eddie. Also in attendance were Tom's nieces Tracy and Theresa, Theresa's family, and Tom's nephew Roy and his husband Mike. It was an additional bonus to spend time with both his sisters, Toni and MaryBeth, each of whom had moved into a new home. From there we drove to Virginia to spend Thanksgiving with Julia and her family and were joined there by Anne's brother Jack, his wife Debbie, son Tim and granddaughter Livia.
